

Ruth's on a Mission

"We are always looking to find new clients who may need our support. I once asked an active fisherman if he knew of any former fishermen who might have retired in the area. He replied: 'we don't retire here, we keep on fishing forever'!"

These are the words of Ruth Charles who joined the Fishermen's Mission in September 2020 as our Mission Area Officer for south east England. Starting a new job during the pandemic has been difficult but Ruth has made a flying start. Ruth comments:

"I haven't really been able to get out and about and make my face known in the harbours, so I've had to be creative in how I've gone about outreach and supporting those needing help. Thankfully, through phone calls and emails, I have helped clients access financial support during such a difficult time for the fishermen here. Many of the new clients I've supported haven't ever needed to ask for help before, and although all our client interactions are kept confidential, the fact they have been supported without needing to physically meet me has helped some come forward who maybe wouldn't have approached me at the harbour." Ruth's patch includes Kent, Sussex, Hampshire, Isle of Wight, half of Dorset, and the Channel Islands.



Ruth is assisted by Mission Port Officer Daniel Huff who covers Shoreham to Eastbourne in Sussex. Most of the fishing here is carried out by smaller inshore vessels crewed by one or two fishermen with the fleet spread across 35 harbours along the coastline. Ruth comments:

"It's great to visit more harbours as the Covid-19 restrictions are eased.

I always say to people I meet they might not need us now, but they may know someone who does. Word of mouth is one of the best ways to get the FishMish's message out there."

Stories of remembrance

"The families have become more than just clients I see. They are real people with real stories. When we go to visit a port, this is what we do. We listen. Not to the stories we want to hear but to their stories, the stories they want to tell us." George Ayoma, Fleetwood Fishermen's Mission.

s Fishermen's Mission Area Port Officer for Fleetwood, George Ayoma has a varied caseload from meeting clients in his Fleetwood office to visiting the remote fishing ports of Cumbria.

Here George tells us about a poignant port visit he undertook this July.

"Today is a significant day in the lives of several families in Maryport, Cumbria. Twelve years earlier I came here in response to the news that the Aquila, a local fishing vessel manned by four of the port's family men, had been lost off the west coast of Scotland whilst returning home with its hard-earned catch.

"Twelve years later I stand at the Aquila memorial overlooking the

harbour. I lay flowers with Pauline and Kathleen, who lost their partners on the Aquila that day and have gone through years of tortuous grief. Only they know the full impact it has had on their lives. I also meet with Shaun who was only a boy when the Aquila went down, and his dad was lost. Today he brings his own small children to the only place they can go to meet the grandad they never knew.

"I also meet Timothy Rowley. Against all the odds, Timothy is the one member of the crew who survived. He recalls that dreadful day, how he clung to wreckage from the boat saying 'I'm too young to go' until he was rescued from the icy waters. Today I find Timothy still trying to recover from the trauma of seeing his friends

perish around him. Timothy is in better shape, and I feel that maybe he has made a breakthrough and there is hope for the future.

"There are a lot of tourists visiting Maryport today. Very few of them know the story of how a picturesque harbour like this can have such a sad story of loss and tragedy. Maybe they will look at the memorial at Maryport harbour and read the words inscribed:"

'Three sons of Maryport who never came home.

When winds and tides are rolling in In silent thoughts you will hear them

It is known as Black Friday. One Friday in 1881 that saw 26 fishing boats and 189 fishermen from Eyemouth lose their lives at sea. A few months earlier 10 boats and 58 fishermen from the island of Yell, Shetland, also perished. From such great loss the Fishermen's Mission was born.

riday 14th October dawned bright and sunny with the gentlest breeze. After a week tied up ashore due to bad weather the fishermen of Eyemouth were keen to get out to the fishing grounds. Hungry mouths needed feeding, they had little choice.

The boats calmly left Eyemouth harbour, blissfully unaware of the hurricane force winds stirring to the south. By noon the fleet were in the teeth of a severe storm. Their wooden boats splintered like matchsticks as wild seas engulfed the crews.

Some boats fled for the shelter of home but were cruelly dashed on the rocks around Eyemouth harbour. Women and children looked on helplessly from the shore. Terrified, they watched their menfolk drown as one boat after another was torn apart by the waves.

A few months earlier on July 20th a fishing tragedy struck the small community of Gloup on the island of Yell, Shetland. Fishing 40 miles north west of Shetland, the open fishing boats had little chance as a northerly gale engulfed them. The storm claimed the lives of 58 men leaving 34 widows. 85 children lost their fathers that fateful day.

In the days that followed the fishwives and their children waited forlornly on the beach, looking out to sea as wreckage washed ashore around them. They looked on with desperate hope whilst knowing the chances of survival were slim. Only seven bodies were recovered.

1881 was a year of fishing tragedy but one man committed to do something about it. He was appalled by the loss of life, the injuries sustained, and the horrendous conditions suffered by fishermen. Ebenezer Mather, a Methodist minister, took the words of Jesus to 'preach the word and heal the sick' as his inspiration and formed the National Mission to Deep Sea Fishermen

Today we remember all the fishermen who have lost their lives over the past 140 years. We thank God that since the day it was formed the Fishermen's Mission has brought hope from tragedy.



The widows and bairns

140 years ago, the widows and bairns faced towards the sea, watching on and crying, sobbing for their menfolk who were drowning and grasping for dear life just off the shore, while the storm raged around them.

140 years later fisherman's wife Betty Gray watched on just as helpless, from her cliffside home overlooking Cove Bay. Lifeboats and helicopters circled, and fishing boats searched. Peter Gray's creel boat had been found unmanned, empty, floating a mile out at sea.

The fishing hamlet of Cove is stunning, with cottages dotted around the cliff side leading down to the harbour. The 1881 Eyemouth disaster claimed the lives of eleven Cove fishermen. In May 2021 another Cove fisherman lost his life to the sea. Peter Gray's wife of 42 years, Betty, with memories still fresh in her mind, remembers that day and her fisherman husband as he tended his creels that Sunday morning.



"I saw all the emergency activity in Cove and feared the worst – something didn't feel right. Peter loved

the fishing and hardly missed a day at sea in over 40 years. He was a fifth-generation fisherman – the Gray family have been part of the fabric of Cove for many years. He was such a kind man, always willing to help out with anything. I'll miss him terribly." Claire McIntosh, Fishermen's Mission Port Officer in south east Scotland, speaks of how she supported Betty and the local fishermen.

"At times like this we are just there to give whatever help we can. That could be something practical or simply chatting and listening. It was a privilege to be part of Peter's funeral service that fittingly took place in Cove. I also spent time with Declan, Peter's nephew, who fished with him and Peter's friends in this close-knit fishing community."

The years may pass but the perils of a life at sea remain unchanging. 140 years ago, the Fishermen's Mission began caring for our fishermen and their families and we are proud to still be doing that today. Please donate now to ensure we can be here for the next 140 years.

That's the amazing number of Covid-19 vaccinations delivered to our migrant fishermen this summer! All around the coastline the Fishermen's Mission in partnership with the Seafarers Hospital Society and local NHS providers have arranged special vaccination appointments.

Carol Elliott, Programme Delivery Manager for SeaFit tells us:

"We want to ensure that all fishermen working from our ports are kept safe and well by receiving the vaccine. Due to the transient nature of their work many migrant fishermen who are age eligible for the Covid-19 vaccine are not registered with a GP, making them at risk of slipping through the

vaccination net. The international crews are highly valued members of the fishing community, working alongside UK fishing crews in confined spaces."

"I'm very grateful to the NHS and Fishermen's Mission for getting my crew vaccinated. It's great for their families at home knowing their loved ones are well looked after." 
British fishing lives through the year


