Providing a lifeline of welfare and support to fishermen and their families

BRIAN'S LEGACY LIFELINE

Last year, gifts in Wills helped the Fishermen's Mission provide nearly 200 people with emergency grants so they could put food on the table for their struggling families.

Brian is 27 and lives alone in Troon, South West Scotland. He is a commercial fisherman, going to sea on local prawn boats. He works long, unsociable hours, often in dangerous conditions. If the weather is particularly bad, the boat won't go out and he will earn nothing. Brian doesn't own a vessel and sometimes struggles to manage his erratic income.

When things became particularly difficult, the Troon Fishermen's Mission team stepped in to help Brian.

Karen (pictured) expertly supported him, addressing his rent arrears by

facilitating a grant which prevented him from becoming homeless. She also provided food vouchers and emotional support as Brian did his best to cope. Today Brian is getting back on track and is feeling a lot less vulnerable. He told us:

"It's no exaggeration to say that the Fishermen's Mission picked me up at the lowest point of my life. They were a lifeline to me when I had nowhere else to turn."

Lost in the flames

A devastating fire has ripped through the heart of the fishing community of Cove Bay, Aberdeen. Fishing boats, storage sheds and fishing gear were reduced to ashes

in a disastrous blaze that broke out overnight in early January. The cause of the blaze remains suspicious. What is not in question is the effect it's having on the lives of the Cove Bay fishermen. One estimated the damage to cost tens of thousands of pounds.

Fishermen's Mission Aberdeen Superintendent Kenny Brandie was quickly on the scene,

"I spoke to a number of the fishermen

and they were visibly upset. For these guys fishing is in their blood, it's more than just a job. Losing possessions in such a blaze is bad enough but this feels so much worse."

Kenny continues to give the Cove Bay fishermen all the support he can and sees some hope for the future, "We are offering to help the fishermen secure metal cargo containers as sheds which will be a huge blessing for them and hopefully prevent something similar happening again."

It is only through your donations that Kenny can be there to offer hope for our fishermen when the unexpected in life happens.



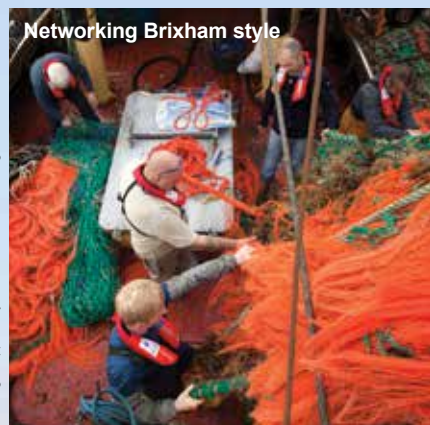

Finding **luxury** in the ordinary

For many of us the simple act of hanging up a shirt or putting a pair of jeans away in a drawer is taken for granted, but for those who have worked on the deck of a trawler their whole life it can be a luxury.

Hauling nets against a backdrop of harsh winter storms as icy waves crashed all around was normality for George, a Brixham fisherman. Now retired and living alone, life for George was increasingly tough. Brixham Superintendent Matt Skinner takes up the story,

“George was barely existing on a very low income and needed items for his unfurnished flat. I arranged the purchase and delivery of a chest of drawers and a wardrobe from a local second-hand furniture store. Now George can move his clothes out of suitcases and feel settled in his new surroundings. It’s a simple thing but for George it meant the world.”

Matt and his team cover the coastlines of Devon, Dorset and Somerset, supporting many active and retired fishermen and their families. His daily routine sees him dealing with everything from practical help concerning budgeting, healthcare and child support to giving emotional help to those confronting loss and loneliness.

However, like all his Fishermen’s Mission colleagues, the routine can be broken at any time with an emergency. Matt recalls one such moment,

“I received a call one Saturday evening from a local hospital. A rather perplexed Doctor had just discharged an injured French fisherman and was at a loss as to how to get him home. After contacting the French Consulate for advice, I set out for the hospital. On the way the consulate called me saying they had booked a berth on a France bound ferry, but it was leaving within the hour! Sticking to the speed limits along the highways and byways of Devon in my trusty Fishermen’s Mission car, I arrived at the hospital. Cries of ‘allez’ and ‘vite’ followed but we managed to get the injured fisherman across town in time to catch the ferry home.”

Matt is also involved in fundraising, the Brixham Fishstock Festival being one of the highlights. Matt comments, “It’s exciting seeing the journey from the money being raised to then using that money to help fishermen and their families who are in need.”

Providing hope, restoring faith

“We really didn’t know how we would get through the next few days. It was Christmas Eve but thoughts of a ‘Happy Christmas’ were far from our minds. We were cold, we were hungry, and Santa wouldn’t be delivering any presents to our kids this year.”

This was the sad situation for one fishing family in Northern Ireland last Christmas. With three children under 11 to care for and no means of providing even the basics, life was looking very bleak, until they called the Fishermen’s Mission.

Superintendent Lesley Hammond tells us what happened next,

“This family really were at a very low ebb. They needed help immediately. We delivered a box of groceries from the local foodbank including the turkey for their Christmas dinner. The issues with their heating were sorted and we ensured they had all they needed to get them through the festive period. Toys were purchased for the little ones, allowing them to experience the joy of Christmas.

The family were amazed at how quickly we responded and said their prayers were answered.”

Lesley and her colleague Superintendent Ingrid Perry support fishing ports and harbours across Northern Ireland. Fishermen’s Mission Centres at Kilkeel, Ardglass and Portavogie provide facilities used extensively by migrant fishermen and are a much-needed social hub for the retired fishing community. Superintendent Lesley Hammond comments,

“Across Northern Ireland we facilitate medical help for injured fishermen, provide financial advice when times are hard alongside welfare care for many of our retired fishermen who are often dealing with loneliness.”

Recently Ingrid helped a family with two young children who had been struggling for a long time. With the fishing tough, their rent arrears were extensive, and they faced the prospect of eviction. Ingrid applied for grants that were thankfully successful. Using her extensive local contacts Ingrid brought other charitable organisations together, providing hope and restoring faith for this family.

“It’s important that the fishing communities know that we are here for them. When you see the relief in the faces of the families that struggle it makes everything worthwhile. God is our provider, prayer is important no matter how big or small the problem is.”

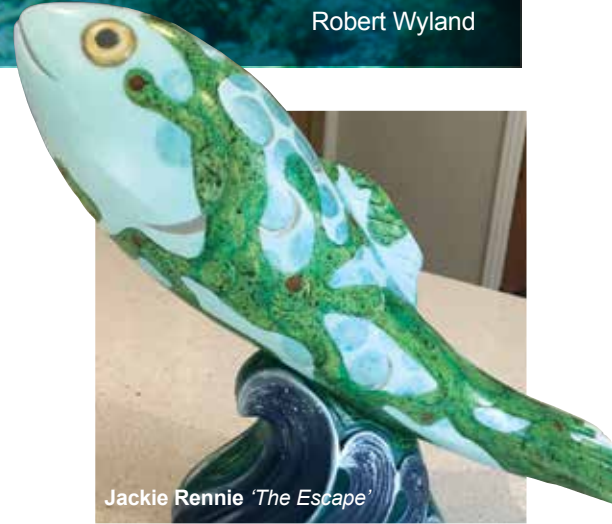

Sea, Salt and Solitude

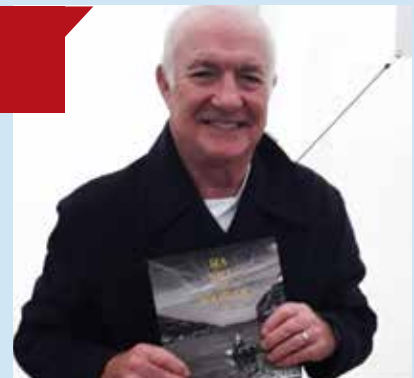
"I love this book in its understated stories of ordinary people who through their lives become extraordinary"
